¹⁹ Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, ²⁰ and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you.

Matthew 28: 19-20

We refer to the Scripture passage written above as The Great Commission. The resurrected Jesus Christ directed his remaining 11 disciples to meet him on a hillside in Galilee. It was there that Jesus made a profound statement to his disciples in verse 18: "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me." After stating his authority, he then proceeds to instruct the 11 disciples on what they are to do next — "... go and make disciples of all nations "


How could the disciples not do as they were instructed? It was coming from the authority Himself! The first eight chapters in the Book of Acts records some of what the disciples did in the time immediately following the commission. Tradition teaches that the disciples did spread out and begin their work of making disciples and baptizing in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Not all of us have the call – the gift – to be missionaries. Its not for us to go to all nations and disciple and baptize. However, we read in Paul's Letter to the Philippians what the Bible commentator, Dr. Henry H. Haley describes as a "most beautiful, exquisite and delicate touch" in Philippians 4: 17 as Paul thanks the Philippians for their monetary support. Dr. Haley wrote explaining the following: "In thanking them for the money, (Paul) tells them that he appreciated it, not so much because he needed it . . . but because it gave them a share in the rewards for his work that would be credited to their account. Because they supported him, his work was theirs. In the final days they would be rewarded for the multitudes of souls they had helped him to save."

Not everyone can be a missionary, but everyone can receive credit to their account. The World Mission Offering is our opportunity to do just that.



During the months of September and October, congregations and churches affiliated with The American Baptist Churches support the ministries that God is using to transform the world. The gifts and offerings received are used to support the work of 75 missionaries and missionary couples who pursue evangelism, teach discipleship and promote theological education.

Our American Baptist supported missionaries are working in some of the poorest, most remote regions on the earth. In addition to teaching the Gospel, our missionaries also help meet the most basic of human needs by teaching agriculture, engineering clean water, providing medical care, building schools, offering micro-loans for women, and caring for orphans – this good works is even longer that what is listed here.

Healthy families include grandparents

Christian families strive to include grandparents in significant family activities. Not just reunions, weddings or anniversaries but when grandchildren participate in such things as recitals, dramas, school sporting events, graduations, birthday parties, family day trips and the like.

Why are grandparents greatly important to the raising of children? Dr. Terry Brazelton, an expert on child development, says grandparents are important to a child's sense of roots. Grandparents are storehouses of information about family history. They help the child to understand how he or she fits into the family saga and who the heroes and heroines of the family have been. For truth's sake - Jesus said the truth makes us free - even knowledge of a family "black sheep" can be told as a lesson to guide children toward more Christlike behavior.

Dr. Brazelton suggests parents prepare children for visits to grandparents who live at some distance. He writes to parents: "Use videotapes, phone calls, stories to keep grandparents close. Tell stories about your own childhood" (Family Circle). The Bible points to another contribution of Christian grandparents. Paul wrote to young Timothy these words: "I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that dwelt first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, dwells in you" (2 Timothy 1:5). Faith, too, can be a wonderful heritage from grandparents.
